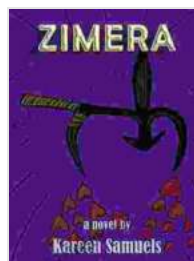


Willa Cather: A Literary Luminary

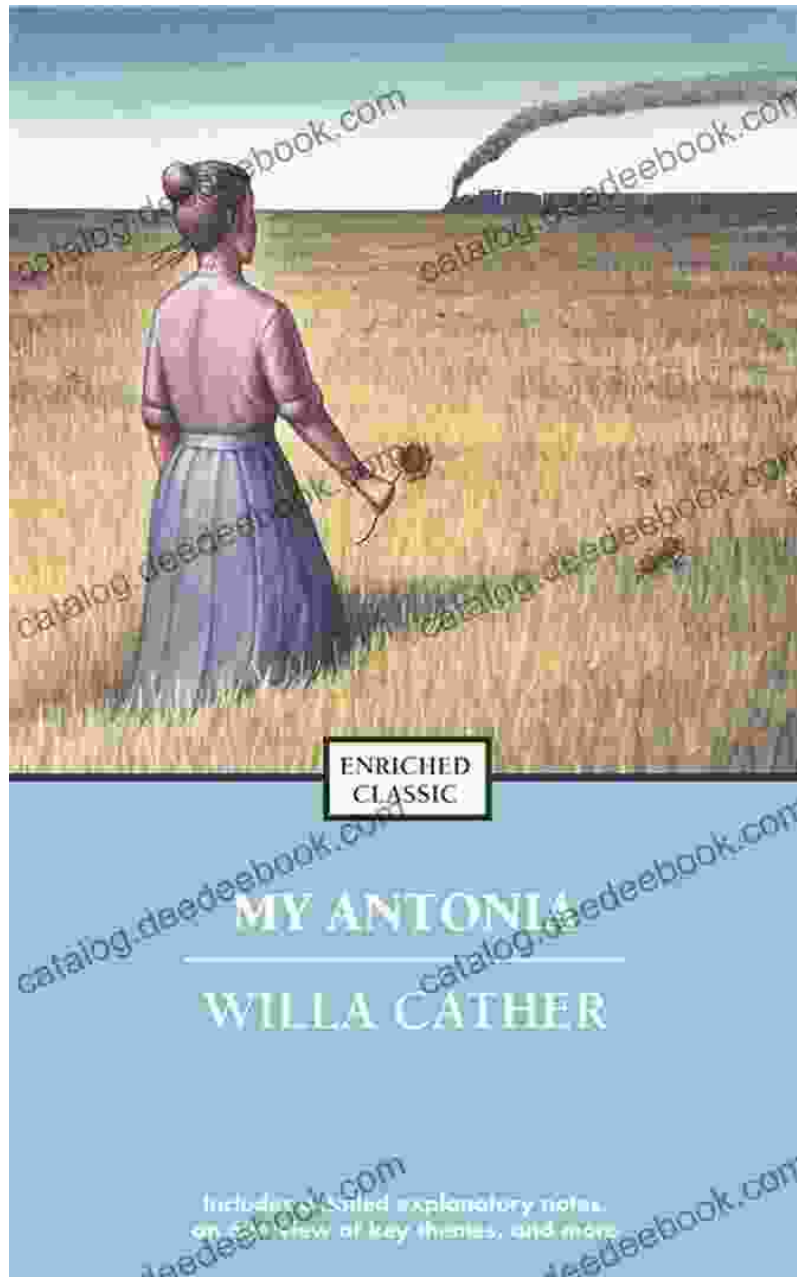

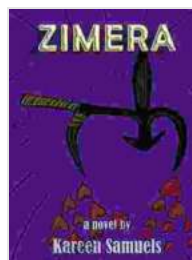
